MEET MEADOW HILL'S MR. FIXIT



When there's somethin' broke in the neighborhood, who ya gonna call?

Probably *not* Ghostbusters, at least if your neighborhood happens to be Meadow Hill. More likely, you'll reach out to MH's affable Facilities Manager, Darien Covert, who's been providing his own brand of TLC to Meadow Hill's grounds and buildings for 20 years.

A native of Vernon, CT – and still a resident there – Darien attended Rockville High School where he played "every sport" including wrestling, football, basketball, and baseball. Somehow, he found the time and energy to participate in Boy Scouts too. That energy level helps explain how he manages the daunting workload of tending to Meadow Hill's 129 homes and expansive grounds.

He joined the maintenance staff at Meadow Hill, and after a couple of years, he was promoted to Superintendent, since re-titled as Facilities Manager. In this role, Darien has overall responsibility for the maintenance and upkeep of "everything you see from the outside of a unit at MH", a jurisdiction that includes grounds and landscaping, roofs, siding, gutters, walkways, snow management, and a whole lot more.

Darien met his wife Annette when he was a senior at Rockville HS, where she was also a student. She is an orthodontist's assistant, and they have two daughters. Alana, 20, is a nursing student; and Jordyn, 16, is entering her junior year at Rockville High. Many of us will get to know Jordyn this summer as she will be working for her dad here at Meadow Hill. When he's not busy keeping MH in top condition, Darien spends lots of time at Jordyn's softball games. An avid Steelers fan, he attends at least one NFL game per season, and loves to go on cruise vacations.

The best part of Darien's position: "there's something different every day; no two days are the same." Throughout his 20 years here, Darien has seen just about everything, including squabbles between neighbors who expect *him* to referee – which he tactfully declines to do. Wildlife Watch: The Bobcat



Living on the banks of the Connecticut River provides an opportunity for some fascinating wildlife sightings. One of the most exciting, though somewhat rare encounters, is to catch a glimpse of a bobcat. I have had this experience twice since I've been at MH, and it has thrilled me both times! Once I even managed to snap a few photos before the cat went on its way. It is easy to identify a bobcat by its size, short bobbed tail, prominent cheek ruffs, and coloring (gray to tan back with faint black spots, black tufts on pointed ears, and white underparts).

According to information provided by DEEP (Dept. of Energy and Environmental Protection), the bobcat is the only wild cat and the top predator found in Connecticut. It is also the most common large cat in North America and has been found in all of the lower 48 states, though its numbers are decreasing in some areas with dense human populations. DEEP believes bobcats currently reside in all eight counties in CT. An individual cat will have a range of 8 to 20 square miles.

Though it is one of the smaller of the wild cats in North America, this handsome animal is still a formidable creature. Generally 2 to 3 times the size of a domestic housecat, adult males weigh between 18 and 35 pounds and average 32 to 37 inches in length. Armed with sharp teeth and claws as well as keen eyesight and hearing, they are patient hunters who have earned their place as our state's top predator. Their diet ranges from cottontail rabbits, woodchucks, squirrels, chipmunks, mice, voles, snowshoe hares, and white-tailed deer (deer taken by bobcats are usually sick or injured, very young or very old). They will also occasionally prey on smaller domestic animals.

Bobcats have more than one mate and do not form lasting pair bonds. They breed in February and March and the litter may have 1-4 kittens, with 2 being most common. Dens are located beneath windfall, or in caves, rock crevices or hollow trees. Kittens nurse for about 2 months, and juveniles may remain with the female until the following spring; males do not participate in raising the young.

Secretive and solitary, bobcats are most active just after dusk and before dawn, and with their preference for thick cover, they are not often observed by their human neighbors. For these reasons, bobcat attacks on people are very rare. When an attack does occur, it is usually because the animal is rabid, as was the case with a widely reported attack on a golfer in Baltic, CT in April.

If you do happen to see a bobcat, enjoy the sighting from a safe distance and do not approach it! Report the sighting to DEEP's Bobcat Project by sending an email to deep.ctwildlife@ct.gov. Include as much information as you can, such as date/time/location of sighting, any other observations, and photos if you take them. SUMMERTIME HEALTH TIPS



Be kind to your skin

That warm wonderful sunshine feels great on our skin. After a long cold winter it is oh so easy to overindulge. But that joy can cost you an uncomfortable sunburn or worse. The American Cancer Society says UV rays are a major cause of melanoma.

Sunscreen can protect the skin from sunburn. The Centers for Disease Control recommends that people apply sunscreen of at least SPF 15 when going outside. Spray sunscreen is not high on the list of recommendations, as it takes a whole bottle of the stuff to provide proper coverage for one person on a day outdoors if used correctly.

Free skin cancer screening is available. The SPOTme (TM) Skin Cancer Screening Program is the American Academy of Dermatologists' longest standing public health program. Dermatologists volunteer their time throughout the year for this program, and the AAD encourages everyone to take steps to prevent skin cancer. This is especially important for men over 50 as they have an increased risk of developing melanoma compared to the general population.


FROM THE GROUNDS COMMITTEE
