

Once it was known that Larry had been treasurer for other non-profits, he was approached about joining the Meadow Hill Executive Board and immediately became Treasurer in 2017. MEADOW HILL BARN and STABLES RESIDENTS

In this truly unique amenity to a condominium community, we now have 2 four-legged residents, frequently visited by Meadow Hill residents and their families. There you can visit Dutchess (Dutch) an American Quarter horse and Koochibar (Kooch) a Gypsy Vanner. Or you might see Dutchess and Koochibar at the green, in front of the barn or while enroute to the river area.



Nancy Roberts tells us about Dutchess: "I first met Dutchess on a cold snowy afternoon in December eight years ago, after looking for horses for about 3 months. She was 16 at that time and the first thing I remember was how I loved her face. She was used as a lesson horse at a farm in Columbia. Young riders would learn to ride on her. I noticed that the barn was busy with tractors, dogs and people. Dutch was so calm around them when I took a ride on her, I decided she was the one! We spent time in East Hampton and then moved to a farm in Colchester. Then, four years ago, I found Meadow Hill. I enjoy taking Dutch for a walk by the river and talking to all the people. It's a good spot for us and we are blessed." Here is some information on the American Quarter horse breed: Ouarter Horses are synonymous with Western riding, ranch work, roping, rodeo sports, cutting and reining. They get their name from Colonial times for being very fast in racing distances up to a quarter mile. The breed has 17 colors, but the most common is sorrel, a reddish brown. Today, quarter horses can be used as English pleasure horses, hunter jumpers, and trail horses. With their calm temperament, they are also a good family horse.

Elaine Lembo tells us about Koochibar: "While on a seven-day riding trek in Ireland, I saw and rode my first Gypsy Vanner horse, whose name was Shrek. I was far away from home but never had a worry riding this steady, curious and fun horse. I just loved the Gypsy's fairytale look and the "I'll take care of you" type of temperament. When I returned home, I found Thorn Hill Koochibar, a 14-month old filly in Naples, Florida. When I visited this young horse, I loved Kooch at first sight. I groomed and played with her until she turned two, then I broke her to ride and alongside of a driving trainer, broke her to drive a horse carriage. Our 15 years together has taught me that animals understand and feel much more than we know. I look forward to a happy retirement with Kooch here in a community that finds pleasure in seeing horses grazing in the field and visiting them by their paddocks!" Here is some information on the Gypsy Vanner breed: They are a rare breed selectively bred for over a half century by the Gypsies of Great Britain to be the perfect caravan horse. The genetic origins of the breed include the Shire, Clydesdale and native British ponies such as the Dales. This breed possesses a temperament that is friendly and engaging, easy to train, smart and willing. Although originally bred to pull a gypsy wagon, they have been ridden in dressage, hunt seat, western pleasure and bareback. The Gypsy Vanner horse is a wonderful family horse.

TREES COMMITTEE COMPLETES ITS DETAILED REVIEW



With the major tree damage of past winters already addressed, the Trees Committee has put plans in place to better manage our treescape. After reviewing the five villages and the paddock area this summer, the committee drafted a spreadsheet of 107 opportunities for new plantings, tree trimming and some tree removals. In addition, a list of trees that will be monitored at least twice a year due to their partial deterioration has been drafted. The multiyear Strategic Tree Management plan has been presented to and accepted by the Board. The top priorities are being addressed by the Board and any future work within the plan will also be subject to Board approval. New submissions for tree maintenance should follow the standard work request process with Imagineers.

WANT TO SAVE SOME MONEY?

Ok, the headline had you hooked. Now I want to talk about that uncomfortable topic of driving skills. Many people fear the day when they lose their freedom by having to give up their license and/or car. Nobody wants to admit any issues with their driving and therefore steer clear of the topic altogether. That is what AARP knows about us, which is why they – along with AAA and other organizations - sponsor a Safe Driver Course geared towards mature drivers. And as an incentive to take this course, many insurance companies give a discount if you have taken it.



But, lots of people say "I've been driving for years; I don't need a refresher course". That's fair, but those same people, who have been cooking for over fifty years will watch tv cooking shows or get recipes from friends - all to gather new tips on cooking better. Go figure.

We recently took a four-hour online AARP Safe Driver Course – breaking up the course into one-hour chunks. You can also find the course offered at the Community Center. The annual discount on our auto insurance policy amounted to \$112 for two cars/drivers, after investing about \$40 for the two of us to register for the course. The discount lasts for two years so it is a good economic return on investment. But the surprising thing is that the refresher was really good – effective reminders on safe driving habits, plus an exercise on the annual cost of owning a car. The course is worth your time and a benefit to your wallet for sure.
