MEET GERRI WHITTEMORE



Mrs. Geraldine Walker Whittemore - Gerri, as she is known to so many Meadow Hill residents- is an amazing person who always has a smile for anyone who walks past her beautiful garden! Every year, Gerri creates and maintains her lovely garden with a mixed variety of colorful plants. Gerri has been a true member of the Meadow Hill community, donating her time and efforts for organized events for many years. She and her late husband, Al, had been Glastonbury residents since their marriage in1945 but because of his failing health, moved to Meadow Hill in 1994. Recently Gerri shared some of her life memories with us.

"I was born in Rutland, Vermont in 1922 into a truly Old Yankee family, with a Plymouth, Mass heritage dating back to 1621. Noah Webster, who composed the First American Dictionary for the American school children, was a family member on my mother's side. I attended grade and high school in Rutland, graduating in 1940. At 6 years old,

my aunt and uncle, who lived in Forest Hills, New York, and did not have children, wished to expand our outside world. For the next ten years, I spent winter and summer vacations in N.Y., ice skating, seeing Broadway shows and vacations at their Long Island Rocky Point cottage. As a result, the fashion world drew me into designing my clothes, dresses, coats and play clothes. In my home economic classes, I entered a statewide competition and won! After graduating, I went on to Traphagen Fashion School, immersing myself in learning to sketch designs for drapes, figure fitting, drafting the pattern and finger points of couture design. At the same time, I took courses at Columbia on fibers, weaving and dying.

December 7, 1942 - Pearl Harbor - changed my desire to immediately look for a job in the New York fashion Industry. All of the war plant manufacturing companies were calling for young girls to come and relieve the young men who answered the draft call and help in the War effort. I was hired at Pratt and Whitney and placed in house #49 to test 2800 Engines which went into the large bombers. While working there, I got married in June,1945 and the war ended shortly thereafter. At that point, I was accepted into a G Fox & Co. merchandise training program and became an assistant fabric buyer and manager. About 5 years later, I was contacted to combine the men's tailor shop, ladies' alteration, bridal shop, monogramming and furs into one large work production, for five new outlying stores. Wow, that was a challenge.

With the war over, we had a large influx of refugees to work for us. There were German tailors who had escaped and still had tattooed numbers on their arms, Jewish women who escaped into the woods, Polish / Jewish men, one fur tailor taken prisoner and sent to Siberia to make fur lined officers' coats, and another Russian doctor, who escaped to the US. I remember four Polish women who escaped from work camps after being assaulted by guards, some left pregnant and had to hide in the Black Forest. And I also remember one special young man, from Italy, who came with nothing and did not speak English. I found him hiding in the hall at lunch time with a piece of Italian bread. I brought him a glass water and he was so very thankful and felt safe. So many of those talented refugee stories had changed my outlook on life and how we must encourage them to live a happier life here. Unfortunately, now I fear for our country, and that our lives will be changed forever! So, at 98 years old, being here at Meadow Hill and having good friends and other people stop by to talk and enjoy my garden brings me very much happiness."

A MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

A few years ago, I was invited to a meeting attended by representatives of condo boards from around Glastonbury. When I introduced myself as representing Meadow Hill, they immediately said in a complimentary, almost jealous way "You have your own staff." Sometimes we lose sight of all the benefits we enjoy from having Darien and Mike dedicated to Meadow Hill.

No doubt you all notice how quickly and thoroughly the recent storm was addressed. I don't believe access to any unit owner or emergency vehicle was blocked for more than five minutes. Some in town had to wait days for public roads to be cleared. Our staff, with the help of two part-timers did most of the clean-up and saved us thousands of dollars and days of inconvenience. Our staff's good relationship with Watson Tree helped get timely assistance with a couple of dangerous items, and later, help with some items too big for our staff and equipment.

Snow removal is another item where we benefit immensely from our staff's efforts. We are not dependent on snow removal contractors who would balance our needs with legitimate demands of multiple complexes. We have equipment and a dedicated crew who can address our immediate needs, at the optimum time, based on the characteristic of a storm, do a thorough job, while continuing to move snow and keep sanding and scraping as the situation demands.

Because Darien and Mike service just Meadow Hill, they have detailed knowledge of the property and can diagnose and address problems quickly and effectively, something we all benefit from. Other complexes must hire out to contractors and management company staff who necessarily have less familiarity with individual associations; they also have overhead associated with bidding, supervision, and travel.

INTRODUCING GROUNDS COMMITTEE LIASONS



THE MEADOW HILL COMMUNITY GARDEN



Meadow Hill is fortunate to have a community garden just beyond the pasture and over the bridge, settled between the brook and the river. We have 14 gardeners using the garden this year.

The gardens look very good this year. Because of the timing of the rain, we didn't need to water much with the hose this summer.

The hurricane knocked only a few things down but most of the garden still looked good. Because the grass was mowed early this year, we had very few mosquitoes all summer.

While we're mentioning the area by the garden, we should also mention the path that runs down from the garden to the river. Another interesting spot to see, is at the bottom of the path to the river is our beach. We have a sandy beach that is about 3ft wide by 40ft long. Many of the hikers walking along the side of the river, stop here to take a break. This is one of a few spots safe to reach the water's edge in Glastonbury along the trail.
