PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Greetings:

I think you will agree that Meadow Hill is a scenic property with an aesthetic charm, from its proximity to the Connecticut River, to the unique and varied amenities offered, and the well-maintained grounds and landscaped areas. We are fortunate to live in such a beautiful area, and we benefit greatly from the attractive appearance. The greater asset, in my opinion, is the sense of community: neighbor helping neighbor. Many of us have moved into Meadow Hill from other living situations, many of which were living in or on private property. We had the privilege of designing and planting the landscaping, using our plots of land for whatever recreational or personal enjoyment that would enhance our chosen lifestyle. We lived in a community setting in many cases, with neighbors with whom we had a cordial relationship, but we were ready to help one another if a need arose, or often just to borrow a "cup of sugar" or have a cup of coffee. However, there were limits to what we could do in terms of local and state regulations that we were expected to adhere to.

When moving into a condominium setting, we are in a similar yet different type of community. Condominium living requires a set of rules and bylaws that have been established to provide a reasonable standard for maintaining the continued attractiveness of Meadow Hill, the protection of property values and the encouragement of friendly, neighborly relationships. As you know, this board has developed a revised set of rules that are consistent with the newly adopted Declaration and Bylaws that are the governing documents established under the Common Interest Ownership Act of the State of Connecticut. The Association board has the responsibility and the legal authority to protect your rights and privileges and to act on behalf of the best interests in the community as a whole and we need your help to fulfill our obligations.

Volunteers are critical to the overall function of the association and there are many opportunities for residents to participate. One of the many advantages of living in an age-restricted community like Meadow Hill is the background, work experience, skills and talents of the residents. In addition to being good neighbors, many in our community have offered to bring their gifts as volunteers. There are standing committees that are seeking help, there are short-term tasks or ad hoc committees that require a limited commitment focused on a particular area or issue, and, of course, there is the Executive Board.

Each one of these groups is seeking people who have an interest in helping to build on the work done previously by other volunteers, and there are a lot of tasks that require many hands to lighten the work load. One common response to being asked to volunteer is that one doesn't have enough experience to be on the board, or doesn't have the time to commit, or that they are too new to know and/or understand the history or background of Meadow Hill. I would ask that you set aside any reticence that you might have and take a leap of faith in yourself! Commit to a one-time social event, or a time-limited committee assignment, or agree to have your name put in nomination for the board (there are different terms of office from one year to three years).

Please read the list of committees and consider volunteering your time for something that looks interesting to you or challenge yourself to learn a new skill. We really need to expand our volunteer resources. Meadow Hill will continue to be the welcoming, cordial, and aesthetically beautiful community only if we find volunteers that are willing to help.

REBUILD UPDATE



Construction is continuing with siding installation and the start of the interior work on fit and finishes. Eversource is in process of replacing the underground wiring to the units and the garages. The work is partially complete with the digging of a trench and the installation of a conduit. Placement of the electrical wiring and connections to the units and the garages will be the next step. The project has experienced a slight delay in the scheduling of the gas company installing gas meters to allow heat to the buildings. The contractor is currently

using temporary heat to allow the workers to perform the interior work. The electrical contractor has experienced a supply chain delay in the delivery of the electric panels, which is delaying making the connection from Eversource. Imagineers and their electrical contractor are working to minimize this delay. While the overall project has progressed well, these delays have pushed the schedule to the end of February for completion.

Rob Bouvier, our insurance agent and Attorney Scott Sandler continue our negotiations with the insurance company to reduce the gap between cost of the





project and the insurance proceeds received to date. Letters have been sent to Unit Owners #6,10,14,50, 76, and 78 and contact made to explain the claim process with their insurance agents under their HO6 policies.

Let's all hope that these delays can be solved, and the project stay on target so that our residents – Toni and Ray, and Molly – can return to the Meadow Hill community. Jim Fuda

RECIPE FOR DELICIOUS COOKIES



Hello fellow bakers! My name is Kathy McCarthy-Proulx and today I'm sharing with you my German grandmother Anna's Soft Sour Cream Pantry Shelf cookie recipe. Mike and I have been making this recipe for over 45 years. We generally tend to make the cookies as cutouts for Christmas but have also made this tasty recipe for Valentine/St. Patrick's Day, Fall/Thanksgiving or as an anytime cutout cookie. I top the cookie off with buttercream frosting and decorate with various designs and sprinkles. These cookies are also delicious with chocolate frosting much like a half moon cookie.

Pantry Shelf Cookies from Kathy McCarthy-Proulx

2 cups sugar 1 tsp baking soda

1 cup butter or shortening (we use butter) 1 Tbsp baking powder

3 eggs 4 1/2 cups sifted flour

1 cup sour cream or buttermilk (we use sour cream) 1 Tbsp vanilla or almond extract (we use almond)

1 tsp salt

Cream together sugar and butter. Beat in one egg at a time. Add sour Cream. In a separate bowl, mix together the dry ingredients. Add the dry ingredients to the wet mixture. Add the flavoring last. Chill overnight (This is important - the colder the dough, the easier it is to work with). Flour the work surface and roll the dough in a fairly thick layer. Cut out, bake on ungreased sheets at 375 degrees for 8-10 minutes or until lightly brown on the bottom. Don't overcook. Makes 60-80 cookies.

A couple of hints: When rolling, use only enough flour to keep the dough from sticking. Excess flour will make the cookies drier. Use fairly large cookie cutters. Avoid intricate shapes - they are hard to cut, and these cookies rise quite a bit, so intricate patterns tend to "fill in" and lose their shape.
